SEASON THAT WAS

A SEASON OF HIGHS AND LOWS FOR THE YEAR 9As

1993/94 was a season of mixed fortunes for the Year 9A cricketers. Some encouraging performances in the practice matches and the presence in the team of a couple of known junior champions promised well for the APS competition which began in earnest out at Keysborough early in February. The opening round was to put it bluntly, a disaster, as our batting collapsed against an accurate Haileybury attack. Despite some resistance from Luke Sier and Nick Carrington, we were bundled out for a mere 42 - having been 6 for 9 at one stage! Extras was in particularly good form and provided our second top score for the innings. Our batting effort was especially disappointing as we had bowled and fielded well to restrict Haileybury to just 128, thanks largely to an excellent spell of left arm seam bowling by Robin Laycock. Putting the opening round well behind us, the boys prepared for a big comeback game against St. Kevins, but the opposition failed to show up! The game was subsequently claimed by Wesley as a moral victory. Round 3 provided the undoubted highlight of the season as a cocky Scotch team were knocked from their pedestal by an enthusiastic Wesley combination. Unbeaten for several seasons, our opponents clearly expected to cruise to yet another victory against a team that had recently been humbled by Haileybury - but they had another thing coming! An excellent team effort with the bat provided us with a solid 181 from our 55 overs, while Scotch struggled to get on top of our bowling and fell almost 80 runs short. Nico Lynch showed the way with an intelligent and courageous innings of 45. Despite injuring his shoulder and being forced to retire during a valuable opening stand with Sammy Rees, Nico returned to slog a surprised Scotch attack around the park during the final overs of our innings. Nicks Harrison and Carrington made a lively and entertaining contribution with a hard hitting middle order partnership and it was Nick Harrison who made life difficult for the Scotch top order when he took the new ball. Strong support from Karune Aurora and Luke Sier kept a tight rein on the opposition batting, but it was Greg Powell's unorthodox left arm spin bowling which did most of the damage. Greg finished with 5/30 from his 11 overs and was well supported in the field by his captain, Michael Maxwell and his team mates.

The game against Melbourne Grammar will be long remembered as the day Wesley drew the short straw. Losing the toss we were asked to bat on a track that resembled the bed of the Yarra River. Only a gutsy, patient knock from Luke Sier and an enterprising tonk from Tim Cookes saved us from total humiliation, as batsmen struggled to adjust to the peculiar pace and bounce of the wicket. The less said about Max's golden the better. By the time Grammar came out to bat the wicket had dried and settled into a very nice batting strip thank you very much, and they knocked off the required runs with little fuss. Disappointing - but that's cricket! Fairer conditions prevailed for the next match against Brighton, and Wesley returned to the winners' list with a powerful performance on the Kennedy Oval. With Harro in top bowling form, and with good support from newcomer Jonno Rose and wicket keeper Tim Cookes, Brighton were bundled out for 86. In reply, the Wesley big guns fired together at last and knocked up a memorable 239. Luke Sier continued his good form, and Barnaby Chessell chipped in with an enterprising 28, but it was Harro and Max who brought the crowd to their feet scattering the field with a punishing array of shots all around the wicket. Xavier brought us back to earth the following week as our efforts to wind up their innings were met with stubborn resistance, and from being 7/127 they slipped away to a final total of 226. This was despite some good bowling by Karune and newcomer, Glenn Baker. Another patient knock by Luke Sier and useful contributions from Chessell and Maxwell were not enough to save us from defeat as the runrate climbed out of our reach. Getting up early for the journey to Geelong on Head of the River day proved well worthwhile, and our final game resulted in a thrilling victory followed by a pig-out at Maccas. Batting first we were able to produce a very competitive total thanks to good contributions all round. Harro's aggressive 39 was a highlight and Andrew Bignall made an impressive debut with a hard hit 25. Geelong took the game right up to us and despite 3 wickets to firstgamer Alan Thomson and a marathon spell from Karune they came dangerously close. In the end however, it was Wesley who took the points as tight fielding and cool captaincy from Harro kept the required runrate out of reach. Our regular captain provided the entertainment during the tea adjournment as he posted a half century on the neighbouring ground in his debut match for the First XI. Well done Max!

Despite the disappointing win/loss ratio, the season provided encouraging signs for the future of Wesley cricket and other players will be certain to follow in Michael Maxwell's footsteps during subsequent seasons. Congratulations to the regulars for their enthusiastic efforts throughout the season, and thanks to Mark Forster, Tim Spicer, Bronson Ritterman and Richard Salter for helping out. Thanks to Peter Harrison and Chris Maxwell for their work with the scorebook, and thanks to the parents who supported the team and added to the enjoyable atmosphere in which the games were played.




AMBITION IN LIFE: To have an injury free season

B.C. (Barny) CHESSELL RHB




MOST ANNOYING THING ABOUT CRICKET:

N.D. (Cazza) CARRINGTON RHB RMF/DOOZYS






B.S. (Bronny) RITTERMAN

Hard hitting middle order batsman who scored a promising 25 on debut. Also showed some form behind the stumps.




M. (Mark) FOSTER




Stretching your muscles before a match is vital. Here we see Henry and Bronny Ritterman performing their favourite warmups. Henry is taking special care not to get stuck!



PREPARING TO BAT



TAKING GUARD



& INSTRUCTING THE BOWLER

Taking guard should never be just a formality! It is important that a batsman knows exactly where he stands in relation to the stumps. Chris Maxwell has taken an unusual guard six inches outside the leg stump. This will enable him to make a quick exit if the bowling gets too fast. To further ensure his survival Chris is taking the provocative step of issuing instructions to the bowler. Unfortunately this tactic may backfire and is not recommended!

THE STANCE




Nick Harrison adopts an orthodox side-on position at the crease. Note his perfect balance and 100% concentration.

BATTING FOOTWORK

The secret to successful batting is confident and correct footwork. Once a batsman has mastered this skill everything else will fall into place. Here we see the forward defensive shot clearly demonstrated by Nico Lynch and Matt Kossatz. It is not necessary however, to smile at the bowler as Matt is doing. On the right, Luke Sier displays his mastery on the back foot as he punches the ball through the covers.

The beauty of the Doozy is its flexibility, and although there are three basic types, it is only really limited by the bowler's imagination...


The Donkey Drop is the most familiar, the Hand Grenade the most lethal, but the Satellite is the ball for the connoisseur!






Jonno Rose pictured during his delivery stride in the match against Brighton. Notice how he hasn't fallen over or lost his run up!



































Luke Sier bowling against Scotch




