

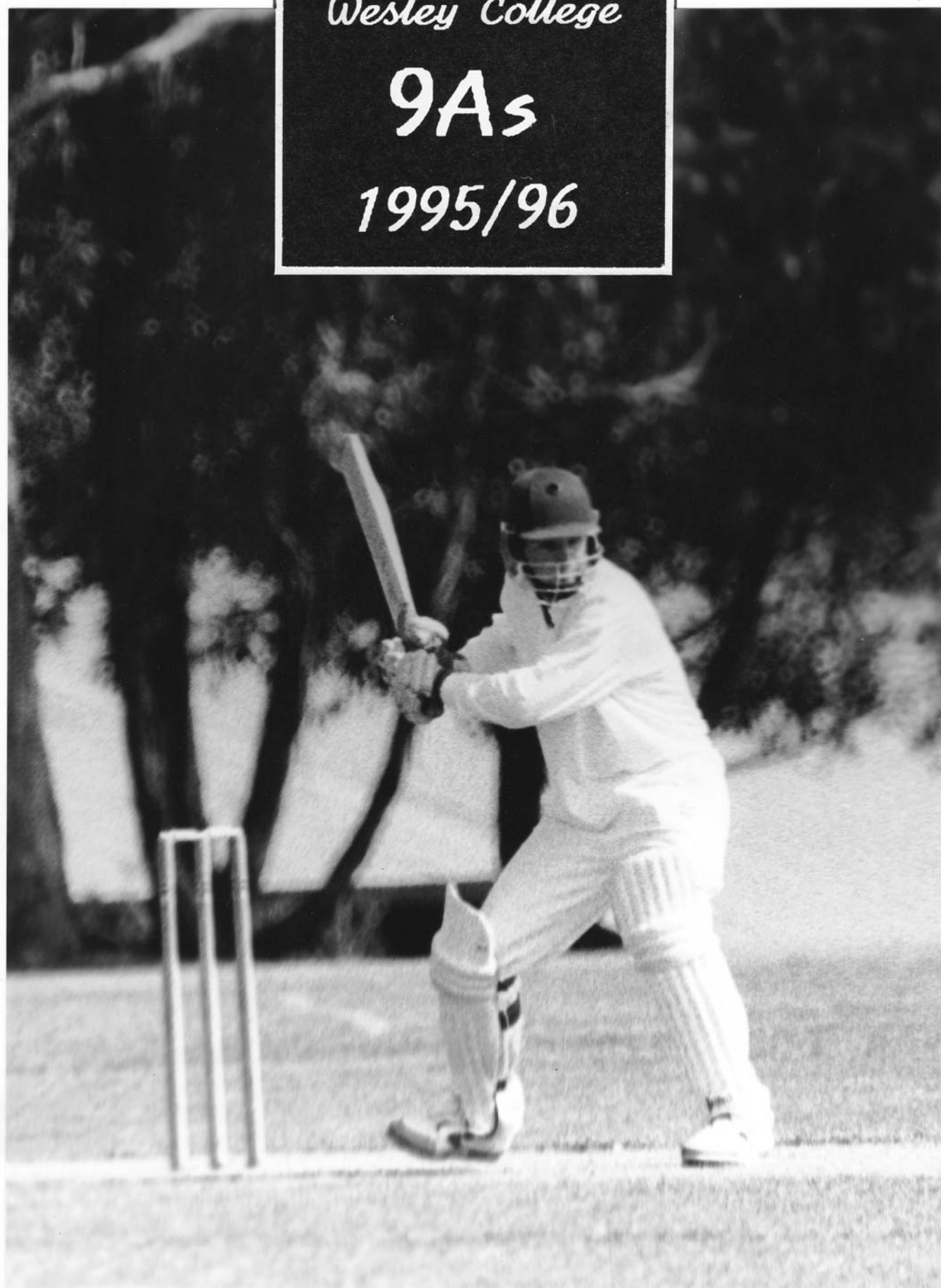

# THAT WAS THE

Although 1995/96 will not go down as one of the greatest seasons for Wesley cricket, it was nevertheless, a season which produced its fair share of individual successes, and a satisfactory, albeit disappointing, win/loss ratio. The most difficult part of the season was combining a convincing batting performance with a steady bowling effort on the same day! Only in the games against Geelong and St.Kevins were our bowlers able to capitalise on a strong batting performance and keep the opposition out of the contest. In the thriller against Haileybury we were lucky to fall over the line, whilst at Carey our batsmen embarrassed our bowlers by falling short of three figures. Xavier remained unperturbed by our bowling attack. Scotch simply outplayed us in all departments!

The season opened with a washout against Caulfield, but if we were to believe playground speculation we would have romped it in! The floods had abated by the following week, and we ventured to Xavier for our first outing as a cross campus College team. Batting first, Xavier had little trouble with our bowling attack, although Dan Kalaitzis looked threatening early, and Andrew Schokman kept things quiet at one end with a tidy 12 over spell. Patient batting produced a century for the Xavier skipper and they reached a sizeable 236 from their 53 overs. Our innings began very well with openers Nick Stone and Andrew Shinkfield staying together for 85 runs. But Shinka's 51 remained the highest individual score as an accurate 18 over spell by a not particularly threatening Xaverian put the brakes on the Wesley innings. Despite an enterprising 32 by Owen Pittman, our wickets fell regularly and we fell 35 short.

The journey to Geelong was much more successful, thanks primarily to Owen's swashbuckling 79 - an innings which threatened to damage both fieldsmen and spectators alike! Unfazed by our precarious position at 3 for not many, Ossie and skipper, Ben Lumb carried our score beyond respectability, and towards a total nearing 200. Some fiery bowling by Jimmy Unthank, and long economical spells from Schokkers, and Leigh Wiegard restricted the hometeam's run rate, and they fell some 40 runs short. Lethal in particular bowled an ideal line and length from around the wicket, and proved very awkward to get away! The fielding too was of a high standard, and good outfield catches to Stoney and Ossie came at crucial moments. Jimmy's direct hit run out was a real bonus! And the BigMacs were well deserved!

The game against Scotch is best forgotten, as our batsmen threw their wickets away with poor running and unfortunate stroke selection. Three ducks amongst the top order had us in trouble at 5 for 40, and it was only a pair of 35s by Tom Harber and Dhruva Rastogi that provided our innings with some respectability. Droovs gave the crowd something to cheer about with a lively boundary laden innings, but both batsman got out when they should have gone on with it! Wayward bowling and lacklustre fielding made Scotch's task with the bat an easy one, and they went on to pass our meagre 135 with ease.

The boys were hoping to recover some confidence and form in Round 5 at Bulleen, but in damp and murky conditions, we collapsed again with the bat to be dismissed some 16 runs short of Carey's not very impressive total. Our bowlers deserved a better result, as they had done everything right in restricting the home team to just 111. Nathan Cooper-Brown found his line and length quickly and settled in to bowl a fine spell of 11 overs for just 8 runs, whilst Rowan Macartney and Lethal bowled well despite a water damaged run up area. Tom Robertson, replacing Tim Mc.Cormick as the team's spinner, picked up a couple of handy wickets, and Droovs and Harbs were unpassable in the field. Patient batting from Stoney and Lumma seemed to be laying the foundations for a Lions victory, but the Carey bowlers gradually eroded our middle and lower order and we were unable to go on and take the points.

One win and three losses at this stage of the season was not a true indication of our players' abilities, and it was great relief to all concerned when the boys managed to turn the results around in the final matches. Haileybury was the first to go down - but only just! Playing on the Williams Oval at Glen Waverley, Wesley held the visitors to 163 from their 50 overs - largely due to some fiery bowling from Jimmy and tidy spells by Lumma and Robbo. Our innings began promisingly as Stoney settled in for another long stay, but Harbs and Shinkas had both departed by the drinks break and the run rate was not quite as it should have been. Ossie came to the crease, and after surviving an early chance, he decided to put his foot down. Driving and pulling with power, Ossie raced towards a ton with the skipper providing solid support at the other end. When Lumma was dismissed with the total

on 155, there were plenty of overs left, and with the fast scoring Dhruva joining Ossie it only seemed a matter of time before the match would be ours. But cricket is a funny game! A few runs later Ossie was run out for 76, and Droovs was joined by a nervous Leigh. Lethal struggled to get bat on ball during the 49th over and could only manage to register a single to level the scores. Tight bowling by Haileybury was making a seemingly simple equation a tough ask, but with 6 balls remaining and wickets in hand the Lions were confident! Then tragedy struck! Droovs was run out stretching for the winning single and suddenly all eyes were turned to Nathan "Plugga" Herman playing in his first game with the As. Could the big fellow do it? Could he connect with one of those legendary swipes and finish the game in an instant? Unfortunately, no. The best he could provide was a swing and a miss. The game would go right down to the wire! With one ball to come, a hurried mid wicket conference resolved to run on anything! The ball headed down the leg side, Plugga swung – and missed again! But Lethal had made his move early and while the keeper fumbled with the ball he sprinted towards the crease. In a panic the ball was hurled at the stumps only to miss and career away towards the long on boundary – for 4 overthrows! What a finish! What a win!

With their confidence restored, the Lions were never going to let the final game against St.Kevins slip, and a steady team effort with the bat produced a pleasing total of 168. Harbs finally came good with an impressive 65, and Droovs chipped in with a handy unbeaten 37. Schokkers closed his eyes to produce the shot of the day over mid on. St.Kevins were never really in the race, and excellent 3 wicket spells by Leigh and Robbo ensured that they not reach three figures.

Thanks to the boys for their co-operation and good humour during the season, and thanks to the parents who provided support and assistance. I trust that the lessons that have been learnt this season will set us up for an even more successful 1996/97.

B.T. (Lumma) LUMBA RHB RM

Although at times the skipper seemed to be suffering from the lingering effects of a pre-season eye injury, he still managed to produce several valuable innings and display glimpses of his stylish batting technique. Unfortunately however, he was unable to produce the big scores that the crowds had come to see. Too often he gave his wicket away after doing all the hard work! Lumma's vocal on field leadership was an important factor in the team's success, and several tight spells of bowling were real bonuses.

**MOST ANNOYING THING ABOUT CRICKET:** Getting out to a spinner.

O.H.S. (Ossie) PITTMAN RHB RM

Ossie proved himself to be the strong, silent type. Rather than waste energy on idle chat, he allowed his bat to do the talking - and on several occasions it really made a noise! At Geelong it sent fieldsmen and spectators scurrying for cover to the tune of 79 runs. Against Haileybury Ossie bounced back after a couple of quackers and wielded it with controlled aggression for another match winning innings. Ossie swung the new ball prodigiously in the opening rounds, but eventually decided it was easier to score runs than save them, and lent his bowling boots to Jimmy.

T.R. (Sydney) HARBER RHB RLS

A batsman who could have walked straight out of a coaching manual, Harbs always looked good with his straight bat and compact defence. An effective worker of the ball, he was usually able to keep the run rate ticking over, but frustratingly was not always as effective when it came to dispatching the loose ball! Harbs' brilliantly compiled 65 in the final round was an object lesson for young cricketers! A serious student of the spin bowler's art, Tom can pick a wrong-un at fifty paces! His good balance and quick hands made him an ideal run saver (and runner outerer) inside the circle.

N.J. (Stoney) STONE LHB RM

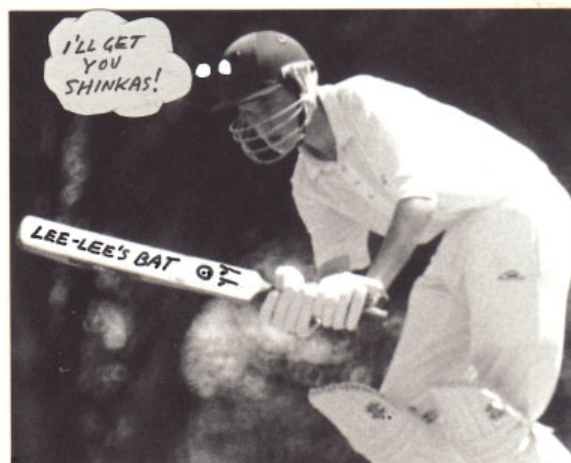
**FAVOURITE FOOD:** Pizza with the lot (Except for the mushrooms, capsicums, prawns, anchovies and olives)

**D.S. (Droovs) RASTOGI LHB R ALL SORTS**

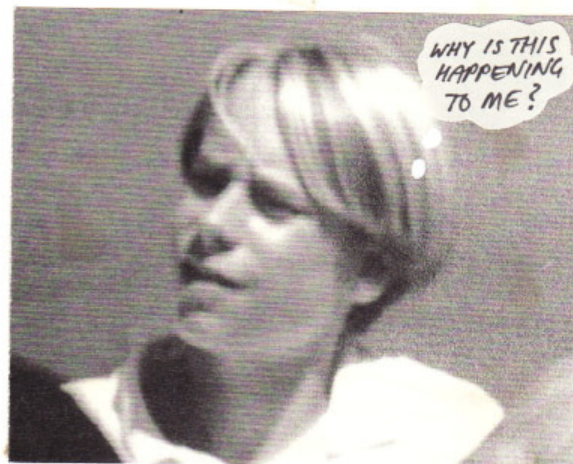

Dangerous speedster whose single appearance with the As produced mixed results. Potentially a regular, but turns into a pumpkin if still playing the game after 1pm!



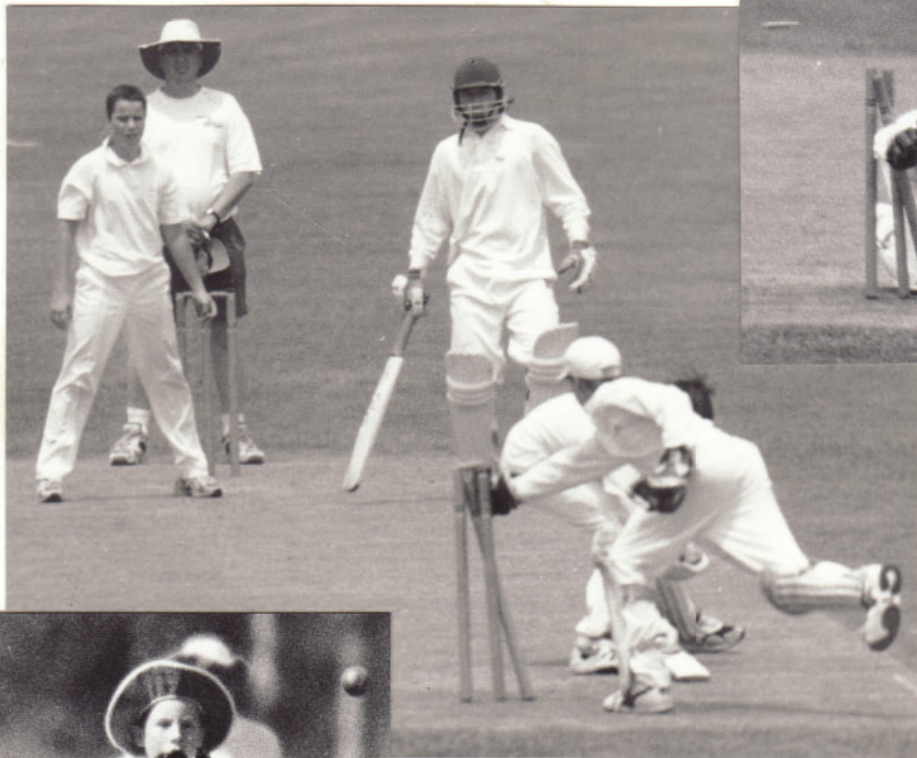

To the left you can see him attempting a very athletic stumping while Robbo and Ossie look on.



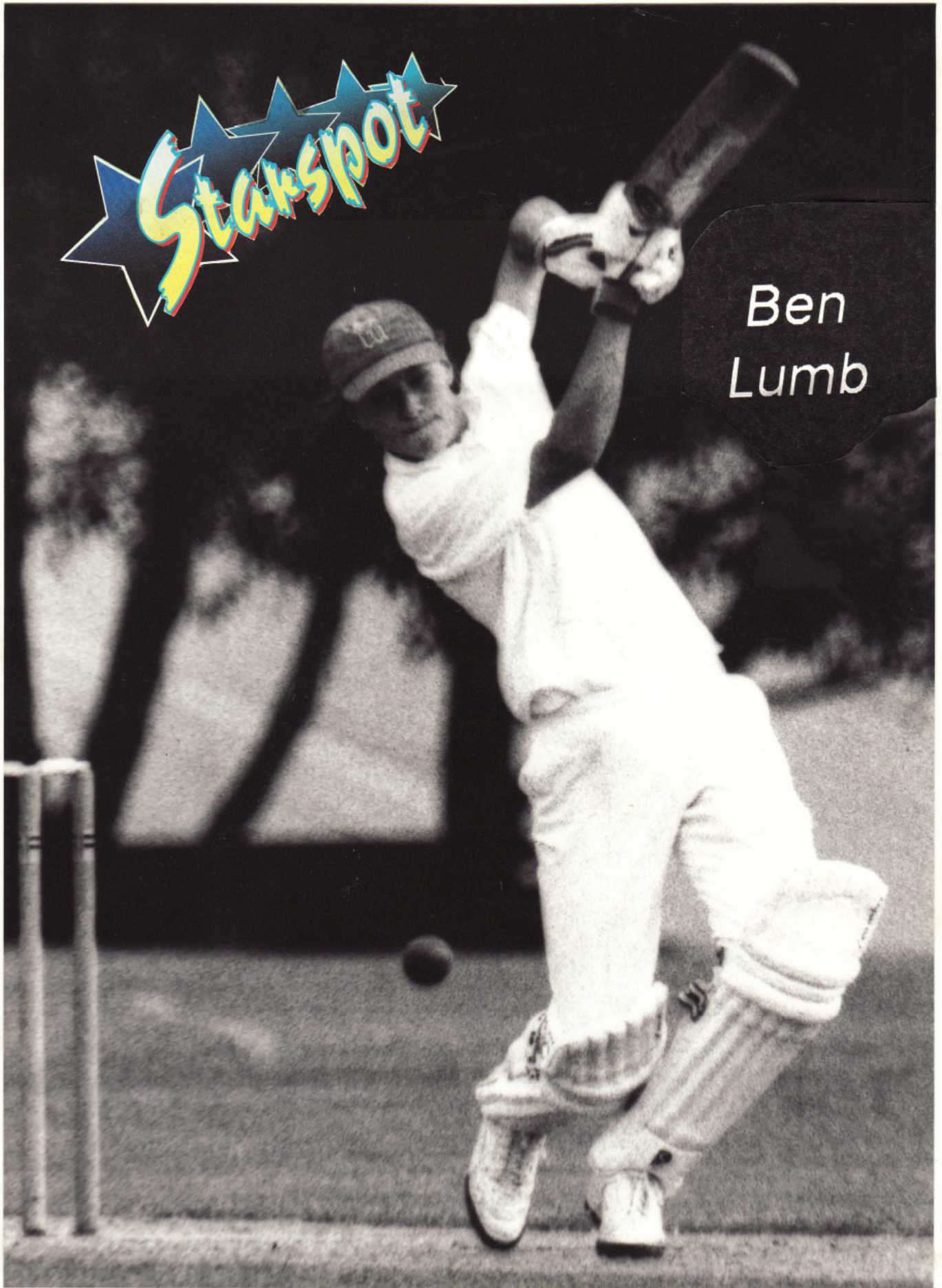

Hi fans! Was your cricket season a big one? Did you crack a ton or snare a hat-trick? I had a few lucky breaks and cracked the big time in 95/96. Just being on the Front Turf with legends like Max and Harro gives you goose bumps. Batting or fielding with them is sensational and I've learnt heaps - so listen up!



## BAT & PAD CLOSE

If you don't keep your bat and pad close together you give the bowler an easy target. Watch out they don't get too close but!

1 Jimmy is not being himself here - in fact he's batting like a boring Pommie! Play your natural game Jimmy!

You've all heard it before, but it helps to be reminded occasionally! Unless you're a genius like Mark Taylor or yours truly, stick to the double hander!

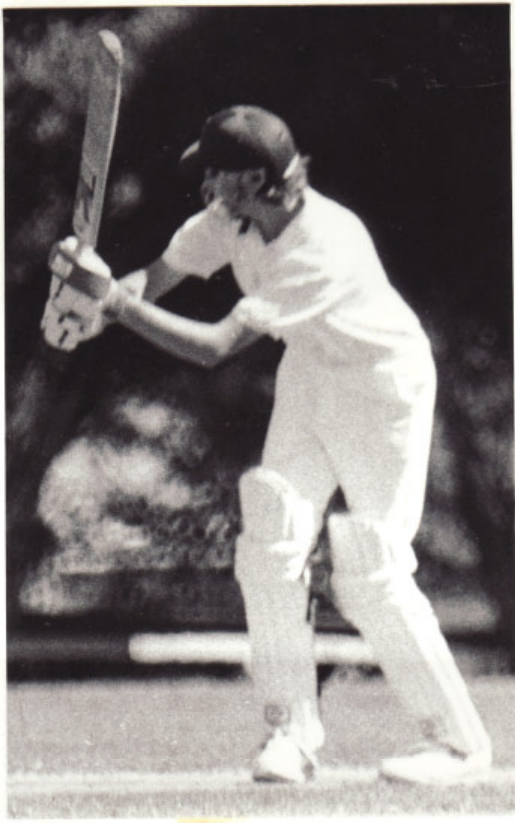
13 Ossie has made the fatal mistake - lucky it's only practice!
