The big match at Albert Park No. 12? on Saturday resulted in a convincing win to the Lions and sounded an early warning to other APS teams.




leading and Laid Back Laycock was


 ${\hbox{NOW READ ON}}$... In a nailbiter of a finish to the Match of the Day at Berwick on Saturday, the gallant Lions hung on against the odds, to register their third win of the season.

It had been a difficult week with the list of unavailable players growing day by day, but the coach and his selection panel remained confident that as long as there were 18 Lions on the field we would have a sporting chance. Nevertheless, the late withdrawal of both Sutton and Knox caused some anxious moments prior to the game.

Apart from the driver taking a wrong turn at St.Kilda junction and heading off towards the beach, the long bus journey was uneventful, and the Lions arrived at Haileybury's Holiday Camp eager to impress the Berwick Bush Bashers with their streetwise brand of football. Moments before the opening bounce on the pocket sized oval, the interchange bench received an unexpected boost as the local rules were explained and the Lions were obliged to clip their wings and field just 16 players!

The game opened in entertaining fashion with both sides playing an attacking brand of football despite the slippery conditions. An electrifying performance by Sammy Rees in the forward pocket set up Plugga Ries for an early goal and dashing play by Akkers provided the spearhead with a second. Unfortunately at the other end of the ground, buslag had taken effect and the Lions' defence was slow to respond to the Burys' forays forward. At the first change the Lions trailed by 2 goals and the situation seemed ominous!

As the Lions sat and sucked their orange segments, the Captain and the Coach hastily convened an emergency strategy meeting. Changes would have to be made! Plugga was by now up the field and Laycock was at full forward. Akkers was to have a run on the ball and Tim Tam Teh was requested to add abit of muscle in the centre. Minor adjustments to pockets had already occurred and Benjy Mark had replaced another first gamer, Johnny Scholes in the backline. Dangerous Dan Hoenig had made his presence felt and the Hubbards were showing their usual versatility in filling gaps allover the field. Silber and Mozza were struggling to find space on the miniature oval as the home team continually crowded our forward line. Five minutes into the third quarter Simon Zydower's big chance came and as he ran off the interchange bench the ball fell into his arms. He passed the ball to Plugga who marked and goaled. Moments later Simon was back on the bench but he had had his moment of glory! Harro was playing a great Captain's game and was reading the play exceptionally well, while Gibbo was continuing to dominate in the air.

A goal to Harro and another to Gibbo - courtesy of Curly Rees reduced the margin to just 7 points, but due to a malfunction in the electronic scoreboard the Lions were led to believe that they would need three straight kicks to overtake the home team. In a low scoring match another 3 goal quarter seemed a big ask! But the Lions rose to the challenge, and while the defence worked overtime to maintain the pressure on their opponents, the on-ballers continued to push the ball forward. NOW READ ON.... 




As the Lions descended on the half time oranges like seagulls at a picnic, the scores read 45 to 25, but the third quarter was a very even one and Geelong used the breeze well


